Books in Progress

Circuits of the Sacred is a project that explores diasporic, intra and inter-Caribbean Afro and Indigenous spiritual practices for how they challenge and transform standing notions of subjectivity, resistance, the building and sustenance of transnational kinship structures, and social justice. This project emerges from several years of collaboration with social justice organizations in the Dominican Republic and from work with the Transnational Hispaniola collective. It extends this work by bringing an interdisciplinary lens to the study of Yoruba/Lucumí traditions as they move between Cuba and the Dominican Republic as well as in New Jersey, offering social justice workers and activists mechanisms for healing and self-improvement. Apart from documenting the specific work of one transnational Yoruba religious house, the project documents the emergence of other movements and dialogues among African diasporic, taino, and popular syncretic forms of Catholicism in Cuba, the Dominican Republic, and among transnational Latin@ communities in the US Northeast.
