## Looking for Tours of Latinx DC?

While you are in DC, you may be interested in learning about the area's rich and varied Latinx history, including its distinctive history of US Central American community-building. In partnership with the Latina/o Studies Association, the National Park Service will be offering walking tours of the Columbia Heights and Mt. Pleasant neighborhoods. ## Traveling with children?

There are many playgrounds and kid-friendly activities and restaurants within walking distance of the hotel or a short subway ride away. Consider the list below a supplement to DC's more familiar national attractions.

### **Activities and Playgrounds**

National Zoo (free): Located less than a ten-minute walk from the hotel, this attraction has many outdoor and indoor areas, plus easy food options.

National Building Museum (fee): A 15-minute ride on the Metro Red Line (from Woodley Park Station, next to the hotel) takes you to this hands-on museum with many activities for toddlers through teenagers.

Walter Pierce Park: Within walking distance of hotel in the Adams Morgan neighborhood, this park has a shady playground good for kids 2-8.

Kalorama Park: Also within walking distance of hotel in the Adams Morgan neighborhood, this park has a good play area for kids 2-8 and an excellent one for kids 8-12.

## Looking for Restaurants?

Open City: Next to hotel, solid diner fare, plus coffee/beer/wine, very kid friendly.

Mellow Mushroom Pizza: Within walking distance of hotel in the Adams Morgan neighborhood.

El Tamarindo: Within walking distance of hotel in the Adams Morgan neighborhood, this Salvadoran/Mexican place is great for an early dinner.

Pitango: Gelato (and coffee) within walking distance of hotel in the Adams Morgan neighborhood.
